Please continue to use the daily prayer cycle if you find that helpful. Last month's magazine included an insert with readings up until the end of May and next month's magazine will include readings for the next period.

There is one particular thing I would ask of you and that is to think about what you are missing during this time and what you are not missing. When we have moved through this period and have entered a new normal (for it will not be exactly what it was before) then we will need to reflect upon what have we missed and what have we not missed? The answers to those questions will be important as we adapt to become the church we need to be in the days in which we now live.

Thank you to everyone who is helping us navigate through these unknown waters and please remember that we continue to be the church – the body of Christ – even when our church buildings are not open.

A story to prepare for Pentecost

Everyone enjoyed Bill's company. He was so kind and so full of life. His eyes never seemed to stop smiling. He was that rare sort of man who always had the right word to say. It was almost as if he knew what was on your heart and mind. Yes, the great thing about Bill was that people could trust him and people did.

It was not surprising then that the news of his promotion, which would mean him moving along a long way away, came as a great blow to all his friends. Of course they were pleased that his hard work had been recognised and rewarded. There was no doubt he had earned his new post; but even so, the thought of his going away from them was hard to take. Where would they be able to turn now for that encouraging smile and sympathetic listening ear? How would they cope without his good advice and thoughtful comments? He knew them all so well and they knew him. Friendship like his is hard to find. It was going to be a great loss.

Yes, everyone who knew Bill was not looking forward to his leaving and they all agreed that things could never be the same again. Of course he might write and there was always the phone and email but somehow that would be no substitute for the company of a man like Bill. You needed to be with him, to see him personally and to share things with him face to face. Pen and paper, telephone voice or Internet message were by comparison far too distant and cold.

If only he could stay. If only they could have him around all the time. If only somehow Bill could be with any of them, anywhere and anytime they needed him. That's what they wanted but of course it was a silly thought.

Follow-up to the story:

I wonder whether you've ever been privileged enough to meet someone in your life like Bill? I wonder whether you have ever known someone who has made such an impact on you, because of his or her understanding and kindness - the sort of friend you just wouldn't want to lose? If you have, then you know how the disciples felt about Jesus. He'd been so special and so important to them that when it was time for him to go, they were really very lost and they longed that he might stay with them for ever.

What was a silly thought for Bill's friends, was however a real possibility for the disciples. Jesus had told them he would come back to them, to each one of them, and be with them wherever they went, forever. Just as Jesus had come down from God, so the Holy Spirit - God in a different, invisible formwas going to come down to each one of them and all this actually happened for them at Pentecost. The Holy Spirit is a person - God coming in another form; Jesus coming back to be with them - and us - for ever.

What is Pentecost?

The church has a birthday, and it's called "Pentecost."

2020 date: : May **31 (Western)**; June 7

(Eastern)

Also called: Whitsunday, White Sunday,

Whitsun

The Christian holy day of **Pentecost**, which is celebrated fifty days after Easter Sunday, commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles and other followers of Jesus Christ while they were in Jerusalem celebrating the Feast of Weeks, as described in the Acts of the Apostles (Acts 2:1–31).



If you go back and read the Old Testament, you will discover that Pentecost was one of the Jewish feast days. Only they didn't call it Pentecost. That's the Greek name. The Jews called it the Feast of Harvest or the Feast of Weeks. It is mentioned five places in the first five books—in Exodus 23, Exodus 24, Leviticus 16, Numbers 28, and Deuteronomy 16. It was the celebration of the beginning of the early weeks of harvest. In Palestine there were two harvests each year. The early harvest came during the months of May and June; the final harvest came in the Fall. Pentecost was the celebration of the beginning of the early wheat harvest, which meant that Pentecost always fell sometime during the middle of the month of May or sometimes in early June.

There were several festivals, celebrations, or observances that took place before Pentecost. There was Passover, there was Unleavened Bread, and there was the Feast of Firstfruits. The Feast of Firstfruits was the celebration of the beginning of the barley harvest. Here's the way you figured out the date of Pentecost. According to the Old Testament, you would go to the day of the celebration of Firstfruits, and beginning with that day, you would count off 50

days. The fiftieth day would be the Day of Pentecost. So Firstfruits is the beginning of the barley harvest and Pentecost the celebration of the beginning of the wheat harvest. Since it was always 50 days after Firstfruits, and since 50 days equals seven weeks, it always came a "week of weeks" later. Therefore, they either called it the Feast of Harvest or the Feast of Weeks.

Bible Stories for Children Pentecost

What is Pentecost? This is a very special time in the Bible when the disciples and other Christians received the Holy Spirit. Before I explain why and how this happened there's a few things you need to know first.

God didn't just pick any day for this to happen. Like everything God does, he has a specific time, purpose and reason for it and Pentecost was no exception.

Pentecost occurred 50 days after Easter Sunday or 50 days after Jesus rose from the dead. Jesus had already gone back to Heaven so the disciples and new believers of Jesus were waiting to receive the Holy Spirit because that's what Jesus told them would happen. Plus, since Jesus wasn't with them any more the Holy Spirit would help bring them closer to God.

Just before Jesus was taken up to heaven he told them that they would receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on them and they'd be his witnesses in the whole world (Acts 1:8). Even more, he told them much earlier that the counsellor (or Holy Spirit) would be sent by the Father, that He would teach them all things and remind them of everything he said to them (John14:26).

So, the Holy Spirit is super helpful to us! He becomes a part of us when we become a Christian and understand that Jesus died and rose for us. When we're ready to try to live a life pleasing to God the Holy Spirit becomes part of us so we have a part of God with us all the time.

The day of Pentecost was a bit different though. People had already become Christians but the Holy Spirit wasn't a part of them yet. This would be the first time everyone who was a Christian would receive the Holy Spirit.

Pentecost was a day to celebrate the end of the grain harvest. It was like Thanksgiving is for us in Canada when the farmers have collected their crops and all the hard work is done.

The people would offer two loaves of bread they had made from their crops and two lambs were waved before the Lord as a thank offering. This was their special way of thanking God for the weather and for helping them get a crop for that year.

The disciples and other Christians had come together to thank God and suddenly a sound like the blowing of a strong wind came from heaven and filled the whole house where they were sitting. I have a feeling the windows weren't open either!

Next they saw tongues of fire that separated and came to rest of each of them. I'm not sure if they could see the tongues of fire or if it's how the people could explain what they felt happening. When the tongues of fire came they were filled with the Holy Spirit and began speaking in different languages.

They may have used the words tongues of fire to explain the way they were speaking and the fire was a way to describe the Holy

Spirit. Either way, they all got pretty excited and things got a bit noisy.

It says that there were people of many different nationalities staying in Jerusalem from all over and many of them speaking different languages. These people ran over to see what all the noise was about and were surprised to hear their own

languages spoken throughout this group. The Bible even lists up to 16 different places people were from and could hear their language spoken!

Things must have sounded crazy! Imagine all these people speaking many different languages at the same time and shouting out praises to God excited that something amazing from God had just happened to them.

It was no surprise that the crowd that had gathered to check out what was happening thought that there wasn't something special happening, after all they weren't there when the Holy Spirit came to them. So some of the crowd started making fun of them and started to think that they had too much wine and it was making them act funny.

When Peter started to hear these rumours he raised his voice and talked to the crowd. He explained that they weren't drinking wine because it was only nine in the morning (people usually drink orange juice or coffee that early in the morning). Plus, the people celebrating Pentecost didn't eat or drink till at least ten in the morning.

He explained that Joel, a messenger of God's word said that this very thing would happen a long time ago. God usually would tell a prophet when something important was going to happen way before it actually happened. Just like the Bible told us a Saviour (Jesus) was going to come and save us long before Jesus was even born.

Peter continued and explained how God brought Jesus to them and that they had crucified him. The crowd understood and felt responsible for doing this and they wanted to know what they could do now.

Peter explained that they should repent (say they're sorry and stop doing bad things) and be baptized so that others would know that they believed in God and were trying to change. Now, because of Jesus death and his resurrection people could be forgiven and receive the Holy Spirit from now on.

That means we receive the Holy Spirit when we accept Christ or become Christians. The word Christian actually means Christ in us. The special thing about having the Holy Spirit is that God never leaves us so we can talk to him or ask for help anytime.

The Holy Spirit actually helps us in many ways, he comforts, teaches, helps us grow in our relationship with God and gives us strength to get rid of the bad habits in our lives. He also gives us power and helps us know when we've done something wrong. Of course, we need to want to grow, learn and change to be more like God for the Holy Spirit to really work with us.

So Pentecost was super special for the disciples and special for us even now because that was the start of us receiving the Holy Spirit and being able to ask for forgiveness.



A poem for Pentecost

Introduction:

The Holy Spirit is described in various ways in the Bible: like water that fills and refreshes; like fire that burns and purifies; like wind that brings life and power. These pictures of the work of the Spirit are important but there is a danger that we then think of the Spirit as a thing. The Holy Spirit is a person ready to be welcomed into the life of anyone who is sorry for the wrong they have done and who asks for God's forgiveness through Jesus. When this person comes in, he makes all the difference. The Spirit makes Jesus real to us. He makes the Christian life possible and he makes our lives new. Perhaps this short poem can help sum up the difference that the third person of the Trinity makes to a Christian's life.

When the spirit comes

Before the Spirit came, you were just words on a page, Black on white and yellowed with age.
Simply a story of long ago,
Of a man who had so much love to show;
Who healed the sick and cured the lame;
Took our guilt and bore our shame.
It sounded so good, but it just couldn't last.

South London Tamil Church (SLTC)

Introduction to URC

The Tamil congregation called "South London Tamil Church" (SLTC) began in 1990 by a group of Tamil members who were worshipping in a Church of England Church called St. Nicholas Church in Tooting. The Tamil members pointed out to Revd. (Dr) John Hall that there was a good number of local Tamil Christians who needed to gather together for worship conducted in the Tamil Language.

After prayer and discussion, it was agreed with the Rector John Hall that this would be possible if they met on Sunday afternoons in the church. There would be a Tamil Committee headed up by Mr. Asbury who would take responsibility for the Congregation and its activities. These would include worship, Sunday School for the children and other social events that would meet the needs of its members. Baptisms, Weddings and Funerals took place according to the practices of the Church of England.

As many of us are aware, The SLTC was started as an outreach



programme of St. Nicholas Church, Tooting to welcome the Tamil youth who left their homeland to save their lives

due to the ethnic violence in Sri Lanka. They were living on their own in the UK and SLTC helped them to find their feet and adjusting to an alien culture and lifestyle. A cricket team was organised which helped the youth to gather together and encouraged them to participate in tournaments with other groups and churches. They also participated in other church activities such as Harvest festivals, Summer sale to raise funds to charities. This helped them to show their hidden talents at these events and at the Christmas carol service.

The Christmas carol service is the most spectacular event in the church calendar, which takes place on third Saturdays of December. This attract many people from all over London and about 250 people attend this service.

Our Easter Sunday bilingual service takes place at 5.30 am in the morning, which is followed by a traditional breakfast. This service too well attended.

The members look forward to the day trip to the seaside in the summer. It is open to non-members and members bring their friends and families. We make fresh food at the site and everyone enjoys the day out.



St. Nicholas church activities increased and having a Tamil service in Sunday afternoon was not possible and SLTC was asked to find another church for worship. Wallington Methodist Church (WMC) welcomed us and we moved to WMC in May 2012. Soon the members were able to adapt to the Methodist way of worship.

WMC is closing and United Reform Church (URC) is welcoming us to continue our worship in Tamil on Sunday afternoons. We intend to move in June and the current situation may delay this.

Times were discouraging but remembering who He is and what He has called us to do; "the unity of SLTC" moved forward in faith and hope, as God gave us churches and called to lead towards His amazing vision.

Many pastors have shepherded us over the 30 years. Their spiritual guidance helped the members to grow in faith and SLTC thank everyone of them earnestly and sincerely for their tireless support to us. May God bless all of them as they continue to spread the gospel to others.

Revd. (Mrs). Deborah Premaraj is our minister now. Revd. D. Premraj who is the Priest in Charge of St. Edward King and Confessor Church in New Addington supports us by providing pastoral guidance. They are guiding us spiritually and we hope we will grow and be enriched by their meaningful messages. Though the churches are closed, we were able to have our Palm Sunday service, Holy week meditations, Maundy Thursday service, Good Friday service and Easter Sunday service via ZOOM, which were well attended.

We hope and pray that this crisis will end soon and we continue our faith journey in the URC church.


