Dear Friends....

This month we complete the journey we have been on toward Jerusalem with Jesus and we shall celebrate Easter on Sunday 4th April. Easter is the celebration of resurrection and falls for us in Springtime. At this time there is an abundance of images around that we can draw on to explain and explore this promise of new life: trees budding and blossom bursting out, flowers blooming, life beginning in lambs and chicks. So many images we could and do draw on.

Some of you however may have celebrated Easter in the Southern hemisphere where Easter comes not at the beginning of Spring but as they enter Autumn. I wonder what images they use to illustrate Easter and resurrection 'down under'. Does anyone know? I have resisted the temptation to 'Google' it and wonder if someone within the church might already know.

I did, however, come across the following poem that speaks of the promise of new life that is to be found in an Autumn fruit, the acorn.

Acorns

by Susan Price

Ripe acorns drop like green-brown hail.

How strange that oaks produce such little fruits:

Nuts capped [or cupped] in woody scales,

waiting for spring to quicken hidden roots.

These nuts fallen on leathered oak leaf litter

do not appeal to me. I tried to eat some as a child, found them mealy and bitter-Yet squirrels value them as hoarded treats, bury hundreds against winter's hunger.
Too many to remember. . . Overlooked, they have a chance to change, take on a younger form, eternal hopes enfleshing, hooked into the tangled now, assuaging grief with emerging root and tender leaf.

Whether we live in the Northern or Southern hemispheres, and whatever imagery and symbols we use to describe Easter, it's all rather meaningless unless we allow the resurrection of Christ to transform us. We need to allow his Spirit to feed, water and warm the bulbs, nuts and seeds of potential, planted within each of us, that they might grow and add to the abundance of new life in the world around us.

It is one year since the UK was plunged into its first national lockdown with Britons ordered to stay at home and all non-essential shops forced to shut their doors to the public.

Was it all 12 long, dark months of rising death rates, longer and longer lockdowns and for many of us life as we know it grinding to a halt.

Yes, the year has been engulfed in sadness and full of tragedy, BUT along the way there have also been positives as we have got to grips with changing the way we live and work in response to the crisis.



When this started Teams were something you supported on a Saturday afternoon and the only Zoom you had was on your camera. Now 12 months later even the most technologically-challenged family member is online setting up breakout rooms and hosting quizzes and get-togethers.

As lockdown took its grip in a bid to push down the infection rate many of us went home and faced up to the fact we were suddenly going to be seeing a lot more of our neighbours.

Some of us have become healthier than ever. the time to go for that run before work while full lockdown saw families get on their bikes to expand their horizons with trips out restricted to only an hour.

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For decades now castaways on Radio 4's Desert

Island Discs have been asked what luxury they would take to their lonely outcrop and last year the nation as a whole decided the answer was self-raising flour. In the face of a global disaster we did not so much turn to drink as bread. Banana bread became the most searched for recipe on the BBC website.

Londoners have always known their home is a green city but perhaps

only now do we truly appreciate the 3,000 parks scattered across it. they have become our stand-in offices, gyms, second homes, scenes of family reunions when lockdowns have been lifted and just a welcome break from the four walls in a city where one in five households don't have a garden.





AND it took a global pandemic to achieve what a million home makeover shows had failed to do and make us realise just how little we really need. Charity shop shelves groaned under the weight of donations, those jeans you've never actually fitted in, that box of stuff saved for a rainy day.



The United Reformed Church is hoping to raise £10,000 for its 'Give Thanks for Your Vaccine' fundraising campaign, developed with Christian Aid.

In the UK, nearly 18million people have had their first dose of a corona-virus vaccine. But for the poorest and most vulnerable communities across the world, there is little hope of a vaccine rollout. These are people who already face lack of water, food, and basic healthcare.

Christian Aid is already on the ground, helping to keep people safe from corona-virus with practical support, but with donations the charity can do more.

To help the charity, the URC's fundraising campaign aims to help people show gratitude for their vaccines and help to protect our global neighbours while the vaccine is out of reach.

All donations will support Christian Aid's response to the corona-virus pandemic in affected communities around the world, including Commitment for Life's – the URC's global justice programme – partner regions.

"The URC is deeply concerned about the unfair rollout of Covid vaccines around the world. Once again, the poorest and most vulnerable people are being pushed to the back of the queue, with only two percent of the world's population vaccinated so far - the vast majority of them in the richest countries. We must and can do better."

Holy Week is when Christians celebrate the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

It is also called Passion Week or Easter Week.

The first Sunday in the week is called Palm Sunday and the second one (the day Christ arose) is called Easter Sunday or Resurrection Sunday.

Test your Bible knowledge with these trivia questions related to Holy Week.

Questions:

- 5. What was the name of the high priest's servant who had his ear cut off by the disciple and subsequently reattached by Jesus?
- 6. How many times did Peter deny Christ after the abandoned the Lord?
- 7. How many pieces of silver did Judas trade the life of Jesus for?
- 8. How did Judas identify Jesus to the soldiers?
- 9. In repentance Judas returned the money to the priests that he was given as the price of betrayal of the Lord and then did what?
- 10. The priests took the money that Judas had returned to them and did what with it?
- 11. Who was surprisingly released before Pontius Pilate sentenced Jesus to death?
- 12. What did Pilate's wife counsel him to do concerning Jesus?
- 13. A man named Simon was compelled to carry the cross of Jesus. In Mark 15 we are told the names of Simon's two sons. What were their names?

- 14. What was the inscription above the cross?
- 15. Can you quote 4 of the 7 statements recorded in the Bible that Christ said from the cross?
- 16. Following the statements of Jesus on the cross, there was a statement by a Roman soldier concerning Christ. What was it?
- 17. What happened in the Temple as a sign that the death of Jesus had made way for the individual believer to approach God?
- 18. When Jesus died there was darkness in the land. How long did it last?
- 19. In John 19 two men helped prepare the body of Christ for burial. One is said to have been a secret disciple and another secretly came to Jesus early in His ministry to ask question. Who were these men?
- 20. Who was the first person to see the risen Christ?


