Dear Friends....

One thing that struck me last winter and has hit me again this year is the amount of mistletoe I see around. When I was growing up in Kent mistletoe was not all that common where I lived, even though the prevalence of apple orchards in the county provided plentiful hosts for the plant. Now as I am driving and walking around Wallington, Sutton and Cheam I am struck by just how much mistletoe there is, usually very high up in the branches of the host trees. It's in the winter months when I notice it although, as an evergreen, it must be in those same trees all year round. However it's when the leaves of the deciduous trees drop in the Autumn that it becomes visible and I am able to wonder at its abundance. If it wasn't for the Winter, with all its negative associations – cold, dark, lack of life, short days – then the wonder of the mistletoe would not be seen. The old stuff needs to fall away so the still living can be seen. No wonder our ancestors saw in mistletoe a symbol of endurina life.

As I thought about this I was reminded of a chapter in the book Bambi. (I don't know whether it made it into the Disney film as I have to confess that is a film I have never actually seen.) In the chapter two leaves hold a conversation about the changing times even bemoaning 'It isn't the way it used to be'. They are afraid of what the future holds and how none of those who have gone before them have come back to tell them what lies ahead. They are desperate to hold on and wonder which of them will fall first.

In this there is a wonderful sermon illustration about the death and resurrection of Christ, who does come back to tell us, and maybe that is an article waiting to be written some Easter. However what struck me this week was the need to let go of the things that have served their time, that seek to sap energy even when they can offer nothing lifegiving. Unless the leaves fall from the tree there will be no new growth and in their falling and rotting the leaves provide something vital for the new life that will come.

What is there in our lives as individuals and as a church that we need to let go off in order that new growth will come? Are there things we are desperate to hold on to which actually sap more energy than they give? In these Winter months can we take some time to clear away the stuff that has built up which obscures the beauty that lies hidden for so much of the year, like the mistletoe in the branches of the plane tree?

Winter may seem a depressing time for many but it is essential if life is to go on being renewed and can be a time when we discover, or rediscover, hidden beauty. May you find beauty in the world and your life this month.

Scouting Reflections

Seeing some scouts and guides and the flags at the Remembrance Sunday church service reminded me also of the many happy years I spent involved with the Scout Group which was sponsored by our church and previously Wallington and Carshalton Congregational Church together with the former Wallington Presbyterian Church. Over many years the church newsletters detailed so many groups associated with the churches, including but not only the Badminton Club, Holmwood Players and the Women's Fellowship. Whilst enjoying the present we must not forget the importance of the past and what it meant to so many people.

I joined what was the 10^{th} Wallington (Holmwood) Wolf Cubs in 1958 and continued as a Scout and Senior Scout through to adult leadership for many years in what became the 8th Wallington following amalgamation with the Group at Christ Church. I spent some 36 years as a warranted leader, including periods at 1^{st} Belmont and 6th Carshalton.

When I was Scout Leader at 8th Wallington I definitely put the "out" into Scouting and whilst membership was held together by the weekly meetings it was the camps and youth hostelling trips which the boys will always remember, plus some other varied activities, such as ice skating, ten pin bowling, caving, hiking and even trips to Croydon's Fairfield Halls for all in wrestling in the days of Big Daddy and Mick McManus. Together with many other adults involved In leadership, fund-raising and administrative roles we provided a lifetime of memories. Sadly, many of those adults are no longer with us but the same can be said of some of the boys I had in the Troop who, when I first became a leader, were very much of my generation. I am now 71 years old!!

A ten day annual Summer camp living together in a farmer's field and cooking over wood fires was the highlight of the Scouting year – we rotated round farms in North Wales, Derbyshire, Cornwall, Somerset, Yorkshire, Kent and the Isle of Wight. I prided myself on taking the boys on youth hostelling trips throughout Britain, to Wales, Derbyshire, East Anglia, the Malvern Hills and several times to Scotland, even via the Kyle of Lochalsh chain ferry to Kyleakin on the Isle of Skye. Hiring minibuses and bikes in Scotland, following a lengthy train trip was not uncommon.

I am bound to say that Scouting was more "relaxed" in those days. I have many photos to prove where we went, such as the attached photo taken at the end of the railway line at Kyle of Lochalsh. Scout Leader John Parkin is seen with Anne Witney who attended many youth hostelling trips. We had just completed a roughly 750 mile rail trip from Wallington, using Family Railcards



where the child fare was just £1 each for the 1500 mile round trip. This was June 1989.

Talking of photos, a few years ago I set up a private facebook site, which has attracted a number of

former members and I have posted to date over 1000 photos of the activities enjoyed by the Scouts, Beavers and Cubs. I have more to post. I am happy to get more people on board. The site is "8th Wallington Scout Group" and I am the owner and my email address is 'trolleybus654@aol.com'. I also have the negatives and many photos taken by former Scout Master "Skipper" Wright, which show the activities enjoyed by the boys in the 1940s and 1950s.
