Dear Friends....

We are now in the season of Advent so let me take this opportunity to wish you a good Advent. I'm not being flippant just trying to draw your attention to this important season of the year which tends to get lost in the preparations for Christmas. Advent is more than the four weeks in which we get ready for the celebration of Christ's birth; it is the time of year when we concentrate on looking at ourselves in the light of Christ's coming. If we were to meet Christ tomorrow, or even today, would we be happy or worried?

Advent is the season of hope, the time of dreamers in the daylight, of prophets and revolutionaries of non-violent belief. The readings of Advent are intended to tear us out of our ruts and out of the usual pattern of our days. They are intended to startle us and awaken us to almost infinite possibilities as we prepare for the coming of Christ into our lives. The opening verses of the second chapter of the prophet Isaiah (vv1-5) set the tone of the coming weeks with a stirring vision of God's hopes for humankind and all creation.

But Advent is also the season of repentance and renewal as we prepare to meet the Christ who comes to us in the Christmas season. When confronted with the light of the world what is hidden in the dark places of our lives is revealed, there is no hiding place, and repentance is the only appropriate response.

At Christmas we use lights in many different ways. We talk of the switching on of the lights; we put coloured lights on our Christmas trees; and we hold candlelight and Christingle services. All these can be pretty, even dazzling and distracting, but let's not forget that one of the themes that runs through John's Gospel is Jesus Christ the Light of the World.

Light overcomes darkness, it can banish fear, and it can also show what has hidden in the dark places that we, or others, would rather not reveal.

With the New Year only a few short weeks away maybe one of the best resolutions we can make is to allow the light of Christ to shine into those dark places of our lives and take a good look at ourselves. Then we can perhaps be a little more honest and open about ourselves, both with God and others, and the light of Christ will be better able to shine through us.

May the deep and rich gifts of Christmas be yours this year.

Please pray for your Ministers, Local Church Leaders and Lay preachers during this busy season. They offer such a great service for the Church. Have a wonderful Advent and Christmas. May we all catch the hope of Christ to share at this dark time. May God continue to do a 'new thing' in you and in me.
