Dear Friends....

Louise, Thomas and I have recently returned from a holiday in Greece. It is a country we love and have visited many times, exploring several of the islands and much of the mainland. The history of the country fascinates me; not just its ancient history, nor the years of conflict with Venetians and Ottomans, but also the more modern history of the 19th and 20th centuries. This latter history is heartbreaking filled with neighbours turning on neighbours and all too frequent atrocities. It is a long way from the picture postcard images of idyllic beaches and holiday romances.

Whilst we were away this time I read a book by Nicholas Gage titled simply 'Eleni'. It is the story of his mother during the Second World War and the Greek civil war that followed and it makes very real the horrendous things experienced and perpetrated during those years. It is a well written and engaging book but I found it hard to read because I knew what was coming – all the worse because it was biography not a novel. The way that those with power and those that sought power treated those around them, including those they had spent their whole lives living beside, is heart-rending and shocking and made me and, I suspect, many other readers wonder 'why?'. Why did they do those things? Why didn't they protest? Why were they so cruel?

And yet, at the same time, I realise it's not that simple. I was reflecting on these things many decades later without the

ever-present threat of starvation, betrayal and death hovering over me, not to mention extreme ideologies borne out of a struggle to survive and nurtured by injustices experienced over many generations. Had I been present in the village of Lia I hope I would have acted differently but would I? Self-preservation is a strong motivator and self-sacrifice a rare commodity so I worry about what would have been my guiding principle should I have been caught up in the struggles of Eleni. However we follow one for whom self-interest was defeated by self-sacrifice and who lived for others rather than himself.

In some ways these questions seem an academic exercise. We are not faced with the challenges of Eleni and the villagers of Lia and it is tempting to dismiss the questions of self-interest and self-sacrifice. However we are about to go to the polls in a General Election which, without the threat of violence and retribution, does ask us to consider not what is best for us but what best helps build a community that enables God's love to be made real. We will find different answers to that question - which is fine – what is important is to know that we have asked the question of ourselves and asked God to help us answer it.

Our Wider Community ...a Local update... Limes Avenue Recreation Ground, Carshalton -New Spring look!

Improvements to the recreation ground started in December 2023.

Work carried out included:

- Planting more trees to create shade and reduce heat
- Using specific plants to help absorb rainwater
- Creating habitats for biodiversity, such as wildflower meadow and native hedgerows





- New information boards identifying potential plants and mini-beasts
- A bug hotel and wooden play features for children to enjoy.

Galatians 5: 1, 13-15

Christ has set us free to live a free life. So take your stand! Never again let anyone put a harness of slavery on you....It is absolutely clear that God has called you to a free life. Just make sure that you don't use this freedom as an excuse to do whatever you want to do and destroy your freedom. Rather, use your freedom to serve one another in love; that's how freedom grows. For everything we know about God's Word is summed up in a single sentence: Love others as you love yourself. That's an act of true freedom. If you bite and ravage each other, watch out—in no time at all you will be annihilating each other, and where will your precious freedom be then? (The Message)

Reflection

The United Reformed Church (URC) and the Presbyterian Church of Myanmar (PCM) has a long and solid relationship. Our 2016 renewed partnership commitment has among its affirmations, a "commitment to give and receive from each other, learn from one another, and to pray for one another as we seek to serve and walk the way of abundant life of God in Christ". In my encounter with the PCM, I witnessed numerous enriching encounters,



overflowing hospitality, and deep resilience among the leadership and members of PCM.

As we continue to accompany our PCM partners in the midst of ongoing oppressive socio—economic and political realities under a repressive regime, a local proverb comes to mind: "Though the centipede has one of its legs broken, this does not affect its movement". The long-suffering PCM family and minoritized groups people in Myanmar remain resilient, yearning for and engaging in a long haul

struggle for freedom. Whatever the cost, we must remain in solidarity with them.

Galatians 5:1ff invites us to consider such a cost given that 'freedom is for freeing'. For, the Christian calling is towards a 'freeing' vocation, habit, and orientation. Discipleship lived in freedom must be a personal and collective responsibility towards this ongoing work. Hence, the imperative to grasp freedom as a vocation. Freedom in Christ is a way of living and not licence to do what we like individually or nationally, unmindful of the effects of our actions on ourselves and others. It is liberation to be our authentic selves. This means to be for others, always working for release from all forms of

enslavement, ensuring vigilance against empire's guile and cunning reach. Freedom is for freeing! This vocation/journey needs a spirituality for the long haul to nourish us for transformative work toward a different world.

Prayer

God-of-a-promised-hope-who-waits-and-heals: may our hearts, so often floating in a sea of choppy waves, find calm in you; may our fevered, wounded and bruised bodies find freedom and wholeness in your love; may the unexpected miracles we experience this day make us more humble to receive your grace; and may the urge to bring hope, care and compassion in distressing situations find sustenance in your promise of full and flourishing life for all. Amen
