# Wallington United Reformed Church



I am shortly heading to Athens for a week's holiday. Although Louise, Thomas and I visited the city a couple of years ago this time I am going on my own. I will be taking the opportunity to explore sights that I didn't see last time and perhaps return to some of those that I did visit last time but that is not the main reason for the stay in Athens.

For over 20 years I have been trying to learn to speak Greek and during that time I have had many lessons but I always find it a struggle to use the language when we are on holiday in Greece. The main reason for this is a lack of confidence which comes from a lack of practice as each year I try to remember what I have learnt (and forgotten) previously. So I have signed up for a 5 day Greek course in Athens where I will have lessons in the morning and then the opportunity to use what I am learning out and about in the city during the afternoon and evening. So although this is holiday it will be a challenging time because I have always struggled with languages.

As you may expect I am now going to make a connection with our Christian faith. Whether speaking about our faith or seeking to live it out requires practice. If the only time we enter into a conversation about our faith is when someone, perhaps unexpectedly, asks us a question we may not have the confidence to respond well. And, like my Greek conversations, it may be very basic and short. However if we cultivate a habit of speaking about our faith, not with everyone we meet but in places and times where we feel comfortable and supported, we are likely to be more able to enter into a deeper conversation when the opportunity arises. Likewise with our Christian living. When confronted with difficult and challenging situations we may find ourselves unsettled and

unable to see where or how our Christian faith can help or guide us. However if we have developed a regular habit of reflecting on our faith, perhaps by asking ourselves some simple questions each day, then we may be more attuned to the presence of God and how we are being called to live. Those questions could be considered at the end of the day and may include: 'For what am I grateful today?' 'What have I learnt about myself/the world/God today?' 'Where did I see God today?'

Like a language very few of us find it easy to be aware of God or able to speak about our faith. It takes practice and commitment and supportive partners along the way who help us, tolerate our stumblings and build our confidence.

That's what I'm hoping for in Athens next week, with regard to my Greek language skills, but I trust it's what we find within the church too with regard to our Christian faith.

### **Angel IV, 2003**

Emily Young
Paternoster Square, London



If you happen to be in London, walking past St Paul's Cathedral and into Paternoster Square – look up. You will see five magnificent angel heads mounted on pillars, gazing out over the city.

When the square was redesigned, the sculptor Emily Young was commissioned to make these guardian figures. Young has been described as inheriting the mantle of Dame Barbara Hepworth as Britain's greatest living stone sculptor. Her works are instantly recognisable. She employs spectacular lumps of stone – quartzite, onyx, marble, alabaster – carving a figure but leaving the remainder of the rock displayed in its raw state, as if the image has grown or evolved organically. As a result, these angels are magisterial, yet they are also flawed, broken, or disfigured.

They are reminiscent of the tall, melancholy angels perched on the buildings of Berlin in Wim Wenders' film Wings of Desire but also of the triumphant archangel in Jacob Epstein's sculpture St Michael's Victory over the Devil outside Coventry Cathedral. Angels have often been depicted as rather fey, ethereal figures, but as the feast of Michaelmas, or St Michael and All Angels, is observed in November in the Eastern Christian tradition, it is somehow reassuring to think of this awesome angel watching over the capital, and indeed over all of us.

### Watership Down Directed by Martin Rosen

Now fully restored in a new 4K restoration, this 1978 tale of rabbits on the run proved that an animated film need be neither made by Disney nor sugar-coated for children

for children.

A prologue details the relationship between the creator-god Frith – represented as the sun – and rabbit-kind. As with most creation myths outside the Judeo-Christian, there's quite a bit of sex and violence. The rabbits breed furiously; hitherto non-carnivorous animals are given



teeth to keep the rabbit numbers down. The rabbits are given powerful hind legs to outrun their predators.

Having established rabbits as intelligent creatures possessing a mythology and a world view, the main story concerns a specific rabbit community. The young rabbit Fiver (voiced by Richard Briers) has a premonition of imminent disaster at their warren. The older Hazel (voiced by John Hurt) knows Fiver to have been right about such things before, and attempts to warn the warren leader, who won't listen.

So Hazel, Fiver, the chief's assistant Bigwig and others set out to find somewhere safer. They have a run-in with the warren's chief of police, and leave him for dead. Traversing woodlands and open countryside towards their destination, they encounter numerous perils, some of them fatal. Snares set to catch them. Hawks, owls, cats and dogs. Also, other rabbit communities, including a militaristic, totalitarian state.

Eventually, they will arrive at the safe haven of Watership Down and befriend an injured seagull. Hazel will meet the Black Rabbit of Death, as all rabbits must, and go on the journey from which there is no return.

All this takes a very different tack from the sentimentalised, anthropomorphised animal tales for which Disney was known. These rabbits talk like humans and are essentially characters in a dark and often violent drama – nature red in tooth and claw, if you will. Although many bad things happen to them, a morality underpins the whole as they attempt to find a better world without lording it over any of their fellow creatures.

### Churches Together South London Forum 16<sup>th</sup> Oct 2024, St Johns Church, Waterloo

This was an excellent opportunity to gain an insight into how local churches have identified and then assisted needs within their community. How they have been assisted by charities and organizations with expertise and funding.

Four topics were offered; Communications, Youth, Chaplaincy and Social Justice.

Rev Steve Chalk Baptist minister and Founder of Oasis Charitable Trust opened the day. He was very positive and encouraging in the influence churches can have. He reflected on a "health service" being within the local Churches. Where people are listened to and prayed for. Knowledge of local services to assist in practical needs.

In the Social Justice "stream" I attended; We played Justice Bingo as an ice breaker! Social Justice and Faith was highlighted by the CEO of "Caritas" Catholics Social Action Network. He takes inspiration from Pope Francis, Martin Luther King in stating Churches should not be shy in speaking out on behalf of the needy. Our Methodist speaker, reflected on Cake Sale fundraising reputation, but that Churches need be of the poor and needy. Not necessarily being able to provide, but essentially to speak up for the local needs to the local council/ governing bodies. When was the last time we engaged as a Church or local Churches Together/invited local councilors/ MP's to meet us.

We may be lucky in Sutton in regard to Sutton Community Works, Street Pastors, Food Bank etc.

**STOP PRESS:** The URC with Baptist and Methodist Churches is a member of JPIT! Only formed in August so no wonder we may not have heard of the Joint Public Issues Team!

It's Aim is to ensure one link Church in every Constituency. This Church to be within a network of local churches and faith - based organizations. To be a link for MP's, particularly to build a relationship, assisting them to speak up on issues of community concerns and wider issues of peace and justice important to the Churches.

Closing the Forum: Richard Redditch Director of Justice & Inclusion Churches Together, encouraged Churches to be more vocal on behalf of the vulnerable in Communities. To practice hospitality, be safe spaces etc.

Bishop Mike Royal, General Secretary of Churches Together: spoke of what he had heard from:

Chaplaincy stream; We need to be Inter Faith literate

Communications: Communicate Christ.

Social Justice: to work alongside people with compassion.

Inevitably there was much more I can tell you and despite being in a minority of attendees who were not employed by churches or other organizations it was a very enjoyable, inspiring, challenging day!
