Dear Friends....

The length of Advent varies; it can be as long as 34 days or as short as 22 days. This year with Advent Sunday falling on the $1^{\rm st}$ of December we are towards the shorter end of the scale.

So how are you going to use the days of Advent? Is it merely a time of preparation for Christmas itself, with present buying, card writing and meal planning taking centre-stage? Will carol services and Christmas performances fill your time over the next few weeks? Are there family traditions that have developed over the years and which must be fitted in to this time?

For many these next few weeks will seem the busiest time of the year and yet the Advent season invites us to step away from what can be a frenzied time to consider the coming of Jesus and what that meant and should mean. Advent calendars are both a help and a hindrance in this as they help us to mark the passing of time but ultimately focus on one day in the future, which can lead us to miss the opportunities of each day we are living.

I'm not suggesting you should abandon your Advent calendar this year, especially if you have decided to use the Sutton Community Works reverse Advent calendar supporting the food bank. However as you open each door/window/box (depending on the type of calendar) maybe you could take a moment to think about one small thing you could do that day to help make the coming of Christ more real in the world.

Of course another way is to use the Advent booklet we have produced with a reading from John's Gospel, a reflection and a prayer for each day of the season. This is the third year we have produced a booklet and this time we again have contributions from both Wallington and St Andrew's URCs but also this year from the South London Tamil Church, who meet in our building each Sunday afternoon. I am grateful to all those who contributed their thoughts – thank you. Please take a copy of the booklet for your home but feel free to take one or more for other people whom you know that you think would appreciate pausing daily to reflect during this season.

At our last Church Meeting back in October I indicated that I needed some help for the service on December 15th. I want to theme the service around nativity sets and hope there are people within Wallington URC who would like to share their set with the congregation at that service. It would be lovely to have several sets in the church for people to see but I realise that many of them will be on display in homes at that time and some may be too fragile to transport to and from the church.

Therefore we will be displaying pictures during the service as we share the story of each set.

If you have a nativity set that is unusual in some way or has a particular story behind it that you would be willing to share please let me know. If you can send or give me a picture that would be great but this could be arranged later (like when you have got it out of the loft along with the other Christmas decorations).

When I know what's available I can plan the service and invite people either to talk about their set on the day or have someone else read what has been written in advance. Because we will be using photos it also means that we can include the sets and stories of those who are not able to be with us on that day.

May this Advent be a journey of discovery for all of us.

Over the garden fence - Reform Magazine



As the Methodist Church arrives at new offices a stone's throw from United Reformed Church House. Reform asks what the new neighbours have in common and whether thev'll ever just move in together. Chatting over the fence are the Revds Micky Youngson, Assistant Secretary of Conference for the Methodist Church in Britain, and Philip Brooks, Deputy General Secretary (Mission) of the URC.

A friend recently said to me, 'I really don't get the

difference between the Methodists and the United Reformed Church.' How close do you think the two are?

Philip Brooks: I guess I'd say two things. I think it's quite good that somebody would say that, because we're not about trying to recruit people to the URC or the Methodists. We're hoping to get people to know and love Jesus in a closer way. So if you're not seeing the labels, that's an advantage.

And a personal response: in my family, on my father's side all of the generations going back were Methodists, and I went to a Methodist Sunday school. On my mum's side, they were all Congregationalists. So I've grown up in a family that didn't see the joins that much at all. And for my first, and actually only, pastorate, I spent ten years in a Methodist circuit as a URC minister. The only time you could see the join was when it came to communion. We took the trays round, whereas the Methodist tradition was for people to come forward to a communion rail.

At local level, I think, for somebody looking for church, if you were happy in a URC, you'd also be happy in a Methodist one, and vice versa.

Micky Youngson: Our histories are different, but it's quite hard to find the dividing lines between the two Churches. Theologically, I've always felt very comfortable with any experience of URC worship. As a superintendent minister I had oversight of two URC-Methodist local ecumenical partnerships (LEPs) and the interchangeability of ministry and of lay preachers was really smooth. Most people in the pew weren't very bothered about which they were. It was their church and that's what mattered...

The United Reformed Church (URC) is relaunching its Gaza Appeal to support urgent humanitarian

work in the region, with an expanded scope to include Lebanon.

We are pleased to announce that this effort is being undertaken in partnership with the Methodist Church in Britain, under the name Gaza/Lebanon Justice Appeal and will be supported by All We Can, an international development and relief organisation.



By collaborating with our partners on

the ground, we aim to provide critical aid and pursue a shared mission of relief and justice for the people of Gaza and Lebanon.

The Revd Philip Brooks, URC Deputy General Secretary (Mission), explains: "Given the desperate humanitarian crisis experienced by the people of Gaza and Lebanon, it is good for the URC and its global justice programme, 'Commitment for Life', to join with our Methodist ecumenical partners and All We Can in support of this vital appeal.

"In the face of overwhelming force and deep injustice, we hope to bring ecumenical solidarity and practical support to help alleviate the plight of so many people who are enduring conflict in this region."

Jude Levermore, Head of Mission for the Methodist Church, adds: "We are called to be co-workers for God's mission of reconciliation and justice, to act and serve among fragile humanity.

"We believe the crucified Christ is embracing the pain of war affecting people from all parties and backgrounds and we feel compelled therefore to act together with care and compassion. We wait for sanity to prevail but in the meantime, we stand with our partners in solidarity and give what we can."

The Methodist Liaison Office (MLO) based in Jerusalem works alongside several partners in Gaza, including the Department of Service to Palestinian Refugees which is part of the Near Eat Council of Churches (NECC) and the Jerusalem Princess Basma Centre which opened a clinic in Gaza early on during the conflict. The URC is a long-standing partner of the National Evangelical Synod of Syria and Lebanon which is working in the region following IDF airstrikes.

Funds raised will be collected by The Methodist Church World Mission Fund and will be shared direct with partners working in the area.




We are very pleased to report that
